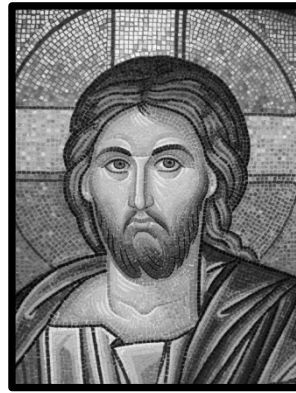

**Wednesday, March 15 – 7:00 - 8:30 pm**

**The Council of Trent (16 Century)** held between 1545 and 1563 in Trento (Trent) and Bologna, northern Italy, was one of the Roman Catholic Church's most important ecumenical councils. Prompted by the Protestant Reformation, it is described as the embodiment of the Counter-Reformation. Trent ranks with Vatican II as the greatest ecumenical council held in the West.

**Wednesday March 22, 2017 – 7:00 - 8:30 pm**

**Jansenism heresy in the Catholic Church (17-18 Centuries).** Jansenism is a complex theory which distorted doctrine concerning the relations between divine grace and human freedom. Condemned as heretical by 8 popes, vestiges of Jansenism remain in our Church today. It is the only heresy in the Catholic Church to become a “negative spirituality.”

**Wednesday March 29, 2017 – 7:00 – 8:30 pm**

**The decline of the Papal Monarchy (19th Century) and the development of Vatican II (20<sup>th</sup> Century)**

Through the historical restructuring and reorientation of the Church during the 19th century, the popes turned more toward pure spiritual and moral leadership in a tangled world. In the 20<sup>th</sup> Century (January 1959), Pope John XXIII announced the creation of the Second Vatican Council which shocked the world. There hadn't been an ecumenical council — an assembly of Roman Catholic religious leaders meant to settle doctrinal issues — in nearly 100 years.

**Our speakers for 2016-2017**



Fr. Fred Licciardi was born in 1950 in Chicago and was educated in the city's Catholic school system. He graduated from Loyola in 1971 with a B.S. degree in psychology and was employed as a therapist at Riveredge Hospital, Forest Park for the next two years. In 1973, Fr. Fred entered graduate school at the University of West Florida and obtained a master's degree in clinical psychology in 1974. He worked as a family and group therapist in the Bureau of Group Treatment in Florida from 1974 until 1978. In the late 70's Fr. Fred was called to the Church, entering the Society of the Most Precious Blood, a religious order founded in 1815 in Rome with a specific ministry of preaching retreats and missions. He completed his theological studies at Catholic Theological Union, earning a master's degree in theology with a specialization in the History of Christian Spirituality. May 28, 1982 he was ordained a priest. Fr. Fred's ministerial career began as Associate Pastor at St. James Church in Columbus, OH. In 1984, he became a prison chaplain at London Correctional Institute in London, OH and was appointed chaplain at Good Samaritan Hospital in Dayton, OH in 1989. In 1992, he became Pastor of the English-speaking Catholic Mission in Zurich, Switzerland. During his ten year stay the mission tripled in membership with representation from 59 countries. He returned to the U.S. in 2002, and began an assignment as Associate Pastor at Holy Family Parish in Inverness. In 2003, he was appointed Associate Pastor at St. Anne Church in Barrington. Then, in July of 2012, he was appointed Associate Pastor of St. Raymond Church in Mount Prospect and came to St. Hubert as Associate Pastor in 2015.



**Michael Keenan** was born in Glasgow, Scotland. His involvement in ministry began in 1978 when he left his job in accounting to work as a lay missionary in Zambia. While he viewed it as a two or three year project, it turned out to be a pivotal point in his life. Returning to Scotland he became a Community Education Worker, but stayed involved in missionary work. He came to Chicago in January 1986 to help in the administration of a small not-for-profit (Volunteer Missionary Movement) to recruit and train lay people for overseas missionary work. Here he met his wife Mary. It was then that he saw the opportunity for a career in ministry, something he had never before envisioned. Subsequently, he received a master's degree in theological studies, from Chicago's Catholic Theological Union and was hired at St. Ansgar in Hanover Park as Director of Religious Education in 1989. In 1999, he became the Director of Religious Education at St. Hubert. He strives to work with parents to form a new generation of Catholics who know and love the Lord and live as his disciples. It is, he says, challenging and interesting work to nurture faith in a world dominated by materialism.



**Marie Staffa** is a trained SoulCollage® facilitator. She earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in Pastoral Ministry from Dominican University and a Master of Arts degree in Pastoral Studies from Loyola University. Involved in parish life for more than 19 years, she is Ministry Coordinator at St. Hubert Church. Spirituality is her passion. She sees the visual arts as spiritual practice and the mystical thread that runs through all religions and wisdom traditions. With companion seekers Marie brings her gift of creativity, listening and openness to the Spirit to this soul work. She views SoulCollage® as a way in which to draw closer to God and promotes self-healing and wholeness. In this process, she believes one discovers God's presence in all of life's journeys. She has been working with her own SoulCollage® deck since 2016, and is passionate about sharing this remarkable tool for self-discovery and spiritual growth. Anyone can do it - no artistic skills or experience is necessary.



**Father Tom McCarthy, O.S.A.** is an experienced teacher, administrator, retreat director and parish mission preacher. He graduated from Villanova University with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Communication Arts, from Catholic Theological Union with a Master of Divinity Degree and from Lewis University with a Master of Arts in Educational Administration. Fr. Tom entered the Midwest Province of the Augustinian Order in 1987, made his solemn vows as an Augustinian Friar in 1993 and was ordained to priesthood in 1994.
